

MINISTER'S COLUMN

Reverend Laura Thompson

I often tell folks that I am grounded in joy. What does that mean? Does it mean that I deny life's challenges? Do I ignore grief and injustice and create a happy little bubble for myself? No, it doesn't mean that. Grounding myself in joy does not mean that I don't experience the challenges of life, it just means that I don't get lost in them because I leave space to see the beauty and love which are also present in every day. I was not always this way.

I worked as a chaplain to a group of folks with Huntington's Disease a few years ago. When I started there, I was overwhelmed with witnessing the sheer amount of grief, loss, and challenge that these folks faced in their lives. Just witnessing this, I became depressed and had a difficult time enjoying or being present to any other parts of my life. One day, during a chapel service I was leading, I began to see things differently; I began to see things more fully.

Pete was a music therapist who had been working at the care facility long before I arrived. When we met he told me that I could do whatever I wanted with the weekly chapel service I led, but that the service needed to always end with the song "This Little Light of Mine." So every week we ended with this song. And at first, I thought we did it because it was familiar and therefore easier for those patients who had difficulty with memory or speech, due to their disease, to sing or clap along. But, then one week, I opened myself to witness something deeper that was going on.

Pete strolled over to Michael with his guitar during the hymn. He strummed and sang with great joy, "This little light of mine, I'm gonna let it..." And then he paused and waited. Michael no longer had the ability to speak or freely use his limbs. He contorted his torso and face and used all of his strength to belt out an exuberant, "Mbriighmm!" It was absolute joy; joy that I had not noticed before because I had been too caught up in the sorrow and challenge that life had handed these folks. And though their disease had taken so much from them, it could not take away their ability to love, their ability to shine, or their ability to experience joy. Since that day, I have made space to see the joy that is present in every day; it is always there.

Have a wonderful summer.



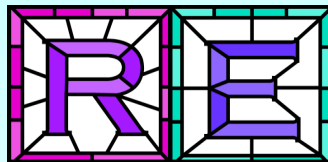
RELIGIOUS EDUCATION CORNER

Update on the Refugee Family - Blog for week of May 14-21

It was so nice to hear the story of our refugee family's journey from Somalia to Minnesota. Ruqiyo was unable to come but, Muna and Abdo did a wonderful job speaking on Mother's Day and what a nice tribute they gave their mother. They spoke of the sacrifices their Mom has made for them to keep them safe and give them a chance at a new life.

This week was busy for Ruqiyo, Muna, Abdo, and Ali. Ruqiyo registered for a new school, Open Door on Lake Street. She'll take the bus with Abdo or Muna in the morning and come home by herself. Muna will end up taking night classes because of her job at Macy's and Abdo will be working at Amazon and/or Macy's. Schedules will be challenging.

Ali will finish school at LEAP in St Paul on June 8 and will register in July at Saint Louis Park High School for next school year.

Navigating the system has been a challenge, too: transferring benefits from Ramsey County to Hennepin County and learning how to find new venues (libraries, banks, health clinics, schools, and bus schedules). We took Ruqiyo to a bank that was listed online as one to cash her benefits check and it was an old TCF bank - all boarded up. That was strange! And

try to get to their apartment: five roads are blocked parallel to their road and all the directions had us going down blocked roads. Road construction is everywhere! The GPS on Muna's phone kept redirecting us down all five blocked roads. Finally I said, "enough already, I'll find my own way"!

NEED: If anyone has a spare box spring for a single bed, we are looking for one. One of the beds came without a box spring and we're looking to raise the bed a foot and give it a little extra bounce. Call Karen or Nan if you find one hanging around your house.

Thanks to the Bruces who have donated two bikes for the boys and to everyone else who has donated everything from furniture to kitchen and bath supplies, to hygiene products and the list goes on. We could not have done this sponsorship without your help.

This Old Earth

My heart sank when I saw a spate of articles in the New York Times and elsewhere announcing a renewed interest in Geoengineering among the military-industrial crowd. Geoengineering - the deliberate intervention in Earth's climate aimed at tamping down its recent violent and erratic behavior - has been lurking at the fringes of climate discourse for over a decade. Trump's election has made deployment and its slippery slope a real possibility.

To understand the sudden emergence of Geoengineering, let's step back 40 years. Exxon-Mobil scientists were charged with understanding everything impacted by their worldwide operations. Their atmospheric studies revealed the existence and scope of global warming due to greenhouse gas emissions. They predicted harmful climate disruptions if fossil fuel burning were not curtailed. This 1977 scenario turns out to have been remarkably accurate.

Exxon and the other oil majors have downplayed public concerns about climate change all these years as the drilling and emissions continued. Profits before planet.



With floods, drought, tornadoes, and hurricanes striking more frequently, the public is finally seeing through the deception and favoring a halt to fossil fuel burning. Big Oil is now forced to "come clean." They have one way out. They could persuade the public that by reflecting some of the incoming sunlight back into space, they can cool the Earth back down as the oil keeps flowing. Sounds good, but we remember from our high school chemistry lab that our experiments often fizzled or singed eyebrows. If unproven Geoengineering were deployed, the laboratory would be Earth and its creatures.

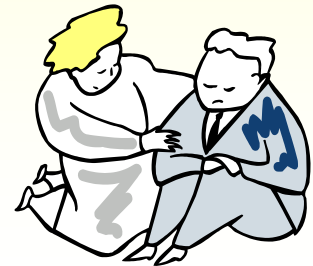
CONGREGATIONAL CARE RESOURCE COMMITTEE

ENDOWMENT COMMITTEE

According to the April Treasurer's Report the endowment fund balance is \$18,075. We are getting within striking distance of the \$25,000 required before 4% of the balance can be spent each year.

How will that work?

The Endowment By-laws spell that out in some detail:

APPLICATION FOR AND DISTRIBUTION OF INCOME

Non-designated gift income shall be available for distribution by the MVUUF Board of Trustees in response to applications for funds from regular MVUUF ministry groups. Applications for funds must be written and received in the MVUUF office not later than November 1 of each year for award the following year. Applications should describe the purpose of the use of the requested funds, applicable budget information, and proposed result of the funded project. Application for funds does not guarantee award of funds. Funds not awarded on an annual basis will be available for distribution during the two following years and if not awarded in the third year they will revert to and become part of the principal of the Fund.

Hanifl Foundation Update for the Annual Meeting

The discussion with the **Hanifl Foundation** started with the property adjacent to the Fellowship (sometimes referred to as the **Zimmer Property**) that the Hanifl Foundation purchased and that the Fellowship is managing. MVUUF is benefiting by receiving the rental income as mentioned in the treasurer's report. We want to thank the Hanifl Foundation for this opportunity which, in addition to generating monies, provides us with flexibility should we want to expand our facility.

The Fellowship was due to purchase or release interest in the property in 2018. However, due to all the transitions that MVUUF has experienced over the past four years, there has not been enough discussion about the property or how it could or should be used. The Hanifl Foundation was asked if this deadline could be extended. The answer is yes, if there is a plan made by MVUUF for the purchase and future use of the property.

During our discussion with Hanifl we were made aware that they are willing to entertain a proposal for a grant which would help us move beyond the current growth stage. The grant is meant to be developmental rather than simply closing gaps in operating expenses.

The Hanifl Foundation assisted the Naples UU Church by funding the difference between their practical budget and their desired budget for two years. The Naples Church was able to achieve its goal in less than one year and the Foundation agreed to allocate the unused funds toward a building project.

Here is what needs to be addressed in order for us to receive financial assistance:

1. What is the church trying to accomplish? Is the goal measurable (or how will we know that we accomplished the goal)?
2. What is the church doing to accomplish these goals?
3. How much will it cost?
4. What is the timeline/deadline for these steps?

As a first step, we engaged a UUA consultant who will work with us over the first weekend in June to help determine the three or four most meaningful improvements or programs we could engage in that would help us to provide more services to our members or our community and to continue our quest to make the world a better place. The details of the weekend are included in the materials which were sent in the Annual Meeting email at the end of May. There also are posters around the church and on the next page in this newsletter. We encourage all of you to participate as much as your time allows.

This is a very exciting opportunity to help us build for the next fifty years of MVUUF.
