Courage

They say to have courage isn't to be fearless, but rather to it is to "be" with your fear. We have many things to fear. Certainly we fear danger, harm and pain of ourselves, and of those we care about. But, we also fear change. We fear loneliness. We also fear things we don't understand; in fact, that might be one of our most common fears.

When I began seminary in 2010, the Intro to Theology instructor gave us this first assignment: in your daily life make some time to intentionally look for God and come back next week to discuss what you find. The first thing that made this scary for me was the fact that I wasn't sure I believed in God. I had a vague concept of universal love or the utmost potential of everything being God... but what is that supposed to look like? I was a bit scared that I might not "see" anything in looking for God and at the same time scared that I would find something.

I set out to look for God on the bus, as it was a time in my schedule when I wasn't distracted by anything else and I could literally just sit back and observe everything around me. It certainly didn't take long for this professed agnostic to start seeing something in the kindness that strangers gave to one another, in the smiles of children playing peek-a-boo with people sitting behind them, and in the constant graciousness and patience of most of the bus drivers. And then I looked deeper and also saw God in the sorrow of those who looked lonely, lost, and forgotten and of those who looked worn from coming and going from their second or third job. For me God became the embodiment of all that life is and all that it can be.

This didn't sit well with me, because suddenly it was all I could see. I went back to my instructor the next week and said, "I think I am beginning to see. But, it is too much. How do I manage it?" She told me that there was no management, there was simply only seeing or not seeing and that once you did "see," you could never unsee.

I'm not proposing that you all go looking for God. But, maybe we could start with being courageous enough to really see one another and ourselves. Are you brave enough to see and be with other people's pain and suffering without turning away? Are you brave enough to really face your own fear and discomfort? What would change if we were all that courageous?

NOTES FROM THE CHAIR

There are two events I want to highlight, one very exciting (and challenging) for our future. The other reminds us to be thankful for the wonderful people that served through the years as pillars of our church.

The **Hanifl Foundation** agreed to provide \$100,000 over two years to help us fund some specific needs in support of our mission and achieving a more sustainable financial base. The Foundation also extended our arrangement regarding the house next door, aka the Zimmer Property for two more years. This gives us the possibility of expanding our facility, plus providing rental income which can be used for long term capital improvements.

There are 3 specific areas we will focus on this year:

- We will hire a professional membership coordinator to work 10 hours per week to help the membership committee.
- We will continue the work we began with Next Steps weekend in which we participated in June by working with UUA consulting to help with our stewardship campaign.
- The third area involves improvements to our technology. This includes better hearing assistance, better sound system, actual 21st century phone system for our staff, and network upgrades.

On behalf of the Board and the entire congregation I want to express our gratitude to the Hanifl Foundation for their continued support.

If you have any questions on any of this, please talk to me or Steve Danko anytime. We will also be providing regular updates in the board minutes on our progress.

Jerry Gilliand, a long time member, was one of the "pillars" who supported our fellowship for many years. Some of you will remember him as our longest serving treasurer. Others will see his smiling face, his great voice and guitar playing as part of The Zenith Avenue music group. Still more will remember Jerry operating the sound system or passing the microphone and the collection plate on Sundays. Jerry served on the board, fixed things in need of repair as part of the Operations committee, and guarded our finances. He cheered us up by just being Jerry and along with his wife, Barb, contributed in more ways than I can count. He was a great friend to many. Some of you never had a chance to meet him as he courageously lived through a very serious illness during the past couple of years. This church would not be what it is today without Jerry's many ways of serving our cause.

Jerry passed away on September 16th. On behalf of the Board of Trustees I want to express our condolences to Barb Gilliand and his entire family. We are thankful for his contribution to MVUUF. Jerry will be greatly missed.

At times our own light goes out and is rekindled by a spark from another person. Each of us has cause to think with deep gratitude of those who have lighted the flame within us.



Minister Call Process and Timing

The Committee on Shared Ministry (COSM) will oversee a call process, anticipating presenting a call to Rev. Laura Thompson on December 10 in order that both the Board and called minister can plan appropriately. The Committee on Shared Ministry has agreed to take responsibility for this task.

The Board selected the following as its goals for the 2017-18 church year:

- Restart the work of deciding on the future use of the Zimmer property, with the input from the Zimmer Property Work Group
- Oversee implementation of the Hanifl two year grant

Street Assessment Update

IS IT TIME TO BAN NUCLEAR WEAPONS?

On July 7, 2017 the United Nations, with support of 122 nation states, adopted a landmark agreement to ban nuclear weapons, known officially as the *Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons*. The treaty prohibits nations from developing, testing, producing, manufacturing, transferring, possessing, stockpiling, using, or threatening to use nuclear weapons. It will enter into legal force once fifty nations SIGN and RATIFY the treaty.

Unfortunately the United States is one of the nations that strongly opposes this ban. Is this contrary to the desires of a majority of the citizens of this country? During these dangerous times of world conflict, it is more imperative than ever that the nuclear option be eliminated from trigger happy leaders.

WAMM (Women Against Military Madness) and peace groups around the state are collecting signatures on a petition that will be presented to the 10 members of the Minnesota Congressional Delegation in late October of 2017.

If this campaign is something you can support please sign the petitions which you will find both upstairs -ON THE TABLE BY THE STAIRWAY and downstairs - ON THE COUNTER. You only need to sign one of the petitions. You can also write a card to your representative and senators about this very important issue.

We, as a fellowship, are an international peace site. We planted a peace pole in our garden some years back and as a whole, we all believe in a more peaceful world. Nuclear weapons do not and never will represent nor encourage a more peaceful world. We have already seen the devastation caused by the bombs dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki in 1945. The bombs we have now can do damage many fold over. Support this campaign to BAN NUCLEAR WEAPONS.

OCTOBER SUNDAY SHARING: BELOVED CONVERSATIONS

During the month of October, the collection plate will be shared 50/50 with the Beloved Conversations Project and the MVUUF Community. Our congregation's continuing financial support for the purchase of this anti-racism curriculum speaks loudly of our willingness to reconsider our UU values in changing times. The values defined in our covenant commit us to an ongoing relationship with our current world.

More than 21 of our fellow congregants registered for this intensive training, which will happen this fall with the assistance of Ginny Christiansen, Tom Ehlinger, Polly Sonifer, and Rev. Laura Thompson. The opening retreat will be led by Rev. Ashley Horan, Executive Director of Minnesota Unitarian Universalist Justice Alliance (MUUSJA or, as it is pronounced, Moose Jaw). In addition to building our understanding of current local and national antiracism actions, members will build community, a strengthened UU value



system, and their creativity. Equally important will be the chance to develop listening skills and non-judgmental attitudes. The Beloved Community is that world which Martin Luther King, Jr. sought.

Now that we have purchased this Beloved Conversations curriculum, we will have the opportunity to repeat it again. Other local UU churches have found it valuable, and at least one, a Minnetonka UU church, is starting their third session!

UUA COMMON READ 2017-2018:

These are the two books the UUA is recommending as great books to look inward, explore, and act to lift up our values. We encourage all to read!

- 1. Centering: Navigating Race, Authenticity, and Power in Ministry, edited by Mitra Rahnema (Skinner House, 2017), centers the stories, analysis, and insights of a number of Unitarian Universalist religious leaders of color as they explore how racial identity is made both visible and invisible in Unitarian Universalist communities.
- 2. Daring Democracy: Igniting Power, Meaning, and Connection for the America We Want, by Frances Moore Lappé and Adam Eichen, (Beacon Press, September 2017) lifts up the importance of democracy itself. It examines the anti-democracy movement that led to the Trump presidency, then offers a vision and call to action to save the democracy we thought we had and to take our civic life to a place it has never been.



OTHER RECOMMENDED READS

Fantasyland: How America Went Haywire: A 500-Year History, by Kurt Andersen (September 5, 2017)

In this sweeping, eloquent history of America, Kurt Andersen demonstrates that what's happening in our country today—this strange, post-factual, "fake news" moment we're all living through—is not something entirely new, but rather the ultimate expression of our national character and path. America was founded by wishful dreamers, magical thinkers, and true believers, by impresarios and their audiences, by hucksters and their suckers. Believe-whatever-you-want fantasy is deeply embedded in our DNA.

Trump and a Post-Truth World, by Ken Wilber (August 8, 2017)

A provocative and balanced examination of our current social and political situation -- by a cutting-edge philosopher of our times. The world is in turmoil. As populist waves roil the Brexit-bound U.K., along with Europe, Turkey, Russia, Asia—and most visibly, the U.S. with the election of Donald Trump—nationalist and extremist political forces threaten the progress made over many decades. Democracies are reeling in the face of nihilism and narcissism. How did we get here? And how, with so much antagonism, cynicism, and discord, can we mend the ruptures in our societies?

It is only when members of society's leading edge can heal themselves that a new, Integral evolutionary force can emerge to move us beyond the social and political turmoil of our current time to offer genuine leadership toward greater wholeness.

This Old Earth

In the hoop-la surrounding the tenth anniversary of Apple's iPhone, there was much gushing about the transformative nature of a device that you can carry around and which can serve you better than a team of communications directors, concierges, and scholars could have back in the past century. However, several essayists have viewed the era of the smart phone negatively. Most bemoan scenes of dinner parties immersed, not in lively talk, but in communion with their devices, heads bowed. At least one observer has found a more ominous fallout.

In this month's Atlantic Magazine, psychologist and author Jean Twenge links smartphones with some alarming trends. She asserts that today's youth (the post-millennials, children of the smartphone era) display a sudden sharp drop in the restless spirit, experimentation, and drive for independence that has always characterized the young. She backs it up with data showing plunges in "hanging out," dating and sex, and driver license applications – and upticks in



lonely feelings and depression. This is good news for fewer teen pregnancies and traffic fatalities, but at what cost? We urgently need a vibrant, questing generation to guide us away from today's impasse, trapped between the dead-end ways of our past and the promise of a future which we know is out there, but which we can't clearly define.

The smartphone is merely the most apparent member of a rapidly growing population of artificial intelligence (AI) products. They are poised to take over tasks for us and deliver the goods and services we receive. Humankind must be vigilant, lest they take over one of our basic capacities: our intentionality, our will. The early readings from the children of AI caution us that we dare not blink
