MARCH'S THEME: BALANCE

What Does it Mean to Be a People of **Balance**?

"I arise in the morning torn between a desire to improve the world and a desire to enjoy the world. This makes it hard to plan the day." - E.B. White

Our theme for March brings us to the topic of balance. In our busy lives we often think of balance as finding time to rest, relax and bring some calm to our often too-busy and stressful lives. Indeed, finding time for rest and things we enjoy is very important. When we are resting we are rejuvenating and healing. Having this as part of our life is crucial to our overall wellbeing and it increases our productivity and creativity when we are working, so it is absolutely something we should strive for.

We also need to have fun, joy and engaged activities in our lives in order to find balance. Hobbies, spiritual practice and time with those we care about give us space to focus on beauty, happiness and gratitude. These activities also remind us of our relationships to the rest of the world. In this space we can find belonging, a sense of groundedness, inspiration and hope. These things bring balance to our lives because they enable us to keep going, to keep working, to keep striving; they give our lives worth. Finding balance in *your* life is great, but how do we find balance in our communities?

Too often our individualistic culture puts focus on personal balance over-shadowing our needs for balance on a larger scale. The result is indifference and oppression. The balance of how whites and people of color are treated in our country is skewed, as is the balance between LGBTQ+ and cisgender/straight folks, between disabled and abled, between rich and poor, between male and female, and between immigrant and natural born citizen. It's hard to find balance between all peoples in a culture where so many kinds of privilege exist.

NOTES FROM THE CHAIR

As we were discussing the preliminary budget at the last Board Meeting, I was thinking about two relatively large line items: returning to our fair share contributions to UUA and to UUA MidAmerica.

We are members of this organization and have been for more than 50 years. Quoting from the UUA website: "The Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) is the central organization for the Unitarian Universalist (UU) religious movement in the United States." And the UUA bylaws: "the primary purpose of the Association is to serve the needs of its member congregations, organize new congregations, extend and strengthen Unitarian Universalist Institutions and implement its principles."

We are one of one of more than 1000 member congregations. Our voice is multiplied when we join with others. Our shared history speaks of love, justice and peace. And struggle.

I want to share with you a few of the more "tangible" benefits of our membership which you may not be aware of. When we rebuilt our current building, UUA gave us financial support of a more than \$30,000 grant. Over the past few years, as we experienced periods of change and transition in our own church, the UUA, specifically MidAmerica, provided us with advice and support. MidAmerica helped us find our minister, Laura Thompson, and encouraged us to follow our own process in making sure this match will be a good one. This year we received another grant of \$3,500.00 to support expanded hours of our office administrator.

We are currently working with Bill Clontz of UUA Consulting on improving our stewardship process and developing an updated vision to guide us into the future. We are using the resource of the UUA to support our RE program and our Music Minister found inspiration and fellowship with other UU music professionals over the years of serving our congregation.

UUA and MidAmerica have many resources which are available to us as publications, webinars and online groups. Both organizations have continuing education opportunities for our minister and other staff members and lay leadership development.

This is not meant to be a complete list. I just wanted to remind us that we are stronger and more effective in our work to make the world a better place as part of the UUA than we could ever be without it. The UUA and MidAmerica Region both need our financial support. By giving our fair share contribution we are also helping ourselves.

FEBRUARY BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

The Board met on Valentine's Day and along with working on church business enjoyed King Cake and chocolate. Chocolate helps one concentrate.

The Board discussed concerns of several members who were not aware of our policy of "sharing the plate". The change was made in March of 2017. Previously, MVUUF contributed a Second Sunday collection only to a chosen organization each month. The treasurer presented data showing that this change resulted in a larger contribution to the organization plus a larger Sunday collection for MVUUF. Other churches who adopted the same change report similar results. The treasurer proposed that those members who wish not to share their Sunday contribution with the church but want the entire amount turned over to the designated organization make checks payable to MVUUF and write "Second Sunday Only" in the memo line of their checks. Writing checks directly to the organization presents administrative issues for the treasurer, doesn't get counted in our "sharing" totals and doesn't get reported in the member's annual MVUUF giving statement. There will be further communication to the membership.

The Board approved a preliminary budget that will be used in our stewardship campaign.

The Board continued to discuss the need for emergency preparedness plans including medical, fire, weather, etc. David Olson will work with members who have emergency training or skills and other resources as necessary and present to the Board a proposal to develop a response plan in a form that would be accessible to staff, ushers and members.

The board welcomed new members Tom Walkington and Maya Walkington-Stauber.

Is Eating Locally a Moral Imperative? Thursday, April 5th 6:30pm at the home of John Peloquin



RELIGIOUS EDUCATION CORNER

Recently I have been reading about the love languages of children. The book is by Gary Chapman and Ross Campbell and the title is, The 5 Love Languages of Children - The Secret to Loving Children Effectively.



Most of us have heard of the five languages of love for our own relationships with adults, but it is also true of our relationships with our children. When you speak the child's love language it is possible fill to the "emotional tank" of the child and, when feeling loved, that child can face the challenging days of childhood and the teen years more easily. Foremost the love needs to be unconditional love and

then we need to find the languages of love that are most effective. The five languages of love are: physical touch, words of affirmation, quality time, gifts and acts of service. There are clues all around to help us find your child's primary language of love and the preferred language may change over the years. There will be a stronger family relationship when we can work with the most meaningful language for your child.

It is of the utmost importance to have unconditional love for your child before anything else. Unconditional love can be challenging, but your child always needs to know that the unconditional love will be there. Saying that you are upset with behavior and not the child is of utmost importance. This is the true foundation of our sacred love for our child.

There are five ways that the authors say you can learn your child's love language: "observe how the child expresses love to you, observe how your child expresses love to others, listen to what your child requests most often, notice what your child complains about most often and give your child a choice between two options." Children may use several love languages so be open to more than one preference.

If you don't know the five language types then get the book or even an adult one to better understand these five languages. All are important to you and your child. Once you figure this out then communication and emotional challenges should soften. This is just one tool of many to help be in better touch with your child. It can be useful with young children and adult children. Pay attention to what your child is saying and it can help strengthen our relationships.

- **I. Transitioning** from the word "pledge" to the word "commitment" to describe our annual financial giving.

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ENDOWMENTDon Park. Chair

The Endowment Committee would like to change the endowment bylaws so that projects can be funded quickly. As things stand no action would be taken on requests for funds until November I, with funds distributed the following April. The Finance Committee feels that for the foreseeable future any endowment-funded project can be immediately funded from savings with reimbursement shortly thereafter from the Endowment. We also made some changes to clarify the intent. The Board gave preliminary approval to these changes at its February meeting. They will have to be approved with a congregational vote at the annual meeting in May. If you have concerns, talk to any member of the endowment committee or of the Board.

Here are the original sections we want to change with strike through or underline on the parts to be deleted and additions in bold:

DETERMINATION OF INCOME DISTRIBUTION

- A. The <u>income</u> money from designated gifts in the fund, <u>which also shall not exceed 4% in a given year</u>, shall be distributed by the Committee as directed by the donors at the time their gift is accepted by the Committee, or as directed by will or other gift document if such direction is in conformity with the general purposes set forth herein. **Distributions shall not exceed 4% of the balance of a fund in any given year.**
- B. The income money from Non-designated gifts in the Fund will be reinvested until distributions of \$1,000 or more can be made without exceeding the 4% maximum distribution (based on the averaged Fund values as of 3/31, 6/30/ 9/30 and 12/31 of the prior year). Distribution of income shall be made annually on April 15 of each year until income exceeds \$10,000 at which time income will be distributed quarterly on January 15, April 15, June 15, and October 15 of each year. (based on the fund value at the approval of the first withdrawal in the MVUUF fiscal year.) Distributions shall fulfill MVUUF's Mission and Vision as determined at the sole discretion of the Board of Trustees.

APPLICATION FOR AND DISTRIBUTION OF INCOME

Non-designated gift income shall be available for distribution by the MVUUF Board of Trustees in response to applications for funds from regular MVUUF ministry groups. Applications for funds must be written **and submitted to the Board of Trustees** and received in the MVUUF office not later than November 1 of each year for award the following year. Applications should describe the purpose of the use of the requested funds, applicable budget information and proposed result of the funded project. Application for funds does not guarantee award of funds. Funds not awarded on an annual basis will be available for distribution during the two following years and if not awarded in the third year they will revert to and become part of the principal of the Fund.

Here is what the final text looks like:

Sunday Service Special Guest Speaker— Mary Moriarty Saturday, April 15th at 10:30am

The Social Action Committee and Beloved Conversations participants are excited to announce that our Sunday service speaker for April 15,

2018 will be Mary Moriarty, Hennepin County Chief Public Defender. For two decades Mary has tried many murder and serious felony cases, including a number that set important state court precedents. She has acquired a national profile as a gifted courtroom advocate with a talent for training others in the creative, powerful trial skills she uses to secure acquittal after acquittal.

Besides being a core faculty member of Gideon's Promise and a recipient of the Steven B. Bright Award, Mary is on the public defender trial skills programs in many states. She teaches at the Harvard Law School Trial Advocacy Workshop and the National Criminal Defense College.

Recognizing that our state's incarceration rates are among the most disparate in the nation (blacks are 10 times more likely to be incarcerated than whites), Mary will talk to how racial bias distorts our criminal justice system.

Once again, we want to thank everyone who contributed non-food items to the VEAP MLK Holiday drive. You helped to make it a very successful event.

Normally we donate food to VEAP during their March Food/Fund drive but this year, because we just had a product drive, we are going to focus on a financial drive, postponing our food drive until May. During March, the non-designated Sunday offering will go to VEAP as well as any additional financial offerings that you wish to give. This year VEAP's financial goal for the March drive is \$150,000.

Although we usually think of VEAP as a food pantry, it is much, much more than that.

This is why our generous giving next month is so important. On-site Social Workers,

Job Counsellors, transportation services, office and pantry space, computers, and more all rely on our financial donations.

But money is also needed to buy food in bulk to supplement our food donations. According to VEAP staff person, Patty Schultz, VEAP can provide enough food for I person for I week at a cost of \$1.50....the cost of one can of beans. So, a \$15 donation will feed I0 people for a week....far more than I0 cans of beans.

Please remember how important this agency is to the people in our community and bring a little extra during March for the offering...it will go a long way to improve the lives of people around us who are struggling.

THIS OLD EARTH

Rev. Karen Hutt, who spoke at MVUUF on Jan. 25, would seem to be an unlikely advocate on behalf of "poor white trash". But, her African-American heritage has given her a unique platform. She artfully juxtaposes the injustices imposed upon the white underclass with the yoke of slavery and Jim Crow. Although these injustices have been carried out by radically different means, the effect has been the same: humiliation. resentment. and



overwhelming barriers to rising out of a lowly status.

Many middle and upper middle class whites are lately becoming aware of (and trying to end) the ongoing racial wrongs which did not end after the '60s civil rights reforms, but morphed in many subtle and less visible ways. Now, we are on the cusp of being onto the ways that we keep the white underclass in their place - without being aware of them. (When did you last strike up a conversation with a "redneck"?). Our "classless" society has been isolating them from the rest of us since we landed on these shores. Only the titles of nobility were left behind. Even the "newly rich" aren't welcome at the country club.

This social isolation is wrong in many ways. It is plain wrong to slam the door to the wider world on our sisters and brothers. Exasperation has finally led them to give up on governance and throw their lot in with charlatans who would settle old scores — but are actually scuttling everybody's chances for a healthy society and a livable Earth.

It would be great if we had a formula to correct this situation, but none is apparent. Somehow, we all must set aside our barriers and join forces. We are all on the same boat (planet).
