#### The Promise and the Practice

In September, our theme was vision. Within that theme we talked about what we bring to the bigger picture and about the need for forgiveness and atonement in bringing our best vision to fruition. This month, we're going deeper than just vision. This month our focus is the UUA campaign "The Promise and the Practice".

The Promise and the Practice is a turning moment; a choice to **listen deeply to the stories in our movement that have not been heard**, and taken to heart, by all Unitarian Universalists.

It's a lamenting of what our Unitarian Universalist tradition and congregations have lost by being—unable or unwilling—to center people of color (or even, at times, to merely include them). The Promise and the Practice is a celebration of our shared commitment to live into a new chapter in the story of our UU faith.

Holding onto the opening words of our mission statement that "we are an inclusive community" and the directive words of our vision statement that we courageously strive to live out our principles justice is a cornerstone of our community it is good and right that we should focus a month of our Sunday services on lifting the up voices of people of color in our denomination and community. At the same time, we will be engaged in the practice of making amends by answering the call of the UUA for every congregation to participate in the funding of Black Lives UU (BLUU).

The campaign has called upon congregations to donate \$10 per member in order to receive a matching grant from a generous donor of up to 1 million dollars. In October 2016 the UUA Board of Trustees made a \$5.3 million commitment to fund black leaders in Unitarian Universalism to support ministry to black-identified Unitarian Universalists. This bold move was and is a part of our faith's commitment to antiracism work and decentering whiteness. While we do this work on Sunday mornings and through our social justice work, it is important that we lift up, value and share leadership with UU's of color.

Throughout the month we'll learn about our history with anti-racism work and about the current work of BLUU. We'll share reflections from UU folks of color. And in our commitment to understanding racism within our broader communities we'll learn about racial bias in our local criminal justice systems. Taking up this work is hard and it can bring up many

feelings. Try to center your feelings about why we are doing this work; to enable a world that is more loving and just, to celebrate and uplift voices from the margins, to reconcile ourselves with the whole. It is through listening and witnessing the pain that white supremacy has caused in all of our systems that we can heal our own brokenness. And it is in creating space for people of color whom we have historically diminished, overlooked and let down to feel safe and empowered that they may heal their wounds and find empowerment. Let us rejoice in the opportunity to engage in this good work.

# **Notes from the Chair**

"Shared Ministry" is the latest buzzword in the field of congregational development. One reason for this could be that can empower each of us to see clearly our stake in helping our congregation evolve and grow with our culture's seismic changes.

"Shared" implies that we each partake and contribute in one way or another. Each of us experiences benefits, and each of us, if only with our presence, gives to and supports our MVUUF community.

"Ministry" refers to how each of us can contribute our gifts, including our gift of presence, in caring and compassionate ways.

"Shared Ministry" acknowledges the ripple effects of each individual life. Words, once spoken and heard, are free for listeners to interpret and pass on. Actions, once taken, create ripples that far outreach the acting individual's line of sight. "Shared Ministry" gives us a lens through which we can consider our words and actions, with intention.

The UUA has proposed some ideas about shared leadership in congregations through which we can consider "shared ministry." One idea includes adapting into our by-laws a description of how a Congregation looks to its minister, and how a Minister looks to its congregation. It includes:

1.2.3. Consistent with our shared values and Principles of Unitarian Universalism, the Minister looks to the Congregation to live out its mission and vision, demonstrate effective leadership, be open to change, broaden the meaning of community, and to communicate issues or concerns that may arise in a forthright and respectful manner.

This highlights the reality that each of us is an integral part of MVUUF, and that we each have a part to play. Please stay tuned for more information about these proposals in the coming months.

**NEW! Join a Soul Matters Theme-Based Small Group - T**wo PILOT GROUPS will be offered on the 4th Sunday from 1-3 and the 4th Wednesday from 6:30-8:30pm. Please contact Andrea Johnson to indicate your interest. The groups meets once a month on the 4th Sunday or 4th Wednesday for approximately two hours.

#### WHAT IS a SOUL MATTERS SMALL GROUP?

SOUL MATTERS are **groups of 5-10 committed participants who come together once a month, from October – June,** with a trained facilitator (Andrea Johnson or Laura Thompson) to nurture spiritual growth in community and engage more deeply with our monthly themes through deep listening and open-hearted sharing. Soul Matters:

Build circles of trust by speaking our own truth, listening receptively to the truth of others and asking each other honest, open questions instead of giving counsel. We offer each other the healing and empowering gifts of silence and laughter rather than "fixing, saving or setting each other straight."

Invite us, through spiritual exercises and questions focused on daily living, to engage the world not as an obstacle course to get through, but as a host of holy voices calling us to greater loving and living.

#### THE NUTS AND BOLTS:

At the beginning of each month, participants will receive a packet of materials based upon the month's worship theme. From these materials, each participant chooses **one** spiritual exercise and **one** deep question to sit with for the course of a month. At the end of the month, participants will gather with their small group to share their experiences of the spiritual exercise, of contemplating their question, and to reflect on the theme.

## **Religious Education Program Updates**

Last month Sara and I welcomed approximately 30 children, youth and their families to the 2018-19 Religious Education Program with getting to know you Sundays. It was fun for us to get to know you and your kids and to have some fun! We also used the month of September to clean and organize the classrooms, train teachers and prepare the curriculum. We are excited to get started with regular classroom lessons. As a reminder the curriculum we have planned is as follows:

• Nursery/PreK - Loving Care for our Little Ones. Due to low PreK enrollment and no teacher volunteers we are asking children up to age 4 to go to the Nursery and children age 5 to join the Kindergarten and 1st Grade Class.

- Kindergarten/1st Grade World of Wonder. This curriculum nurtures a sense of wonder and respect for the web of life and appreciation of its beauty, excitement and mystery.
- 2nd/3rd Grade **NEW!** Soul Matters Theme based curriculum. Stories and activities based on the monthly themes. Enables children and adults to talk together about what they are learning and experiencing at church together.
- 4th/5th Grade Empowers children to become motivated, passionate and engaged in Social Justice and Action using the moral and social values that arise for Harry Potter and friends.
- Middle and High School Youth We are getting to know this group of young people are still fine tuning curriculum options for this group.

# Sunday Sharing for October: Black Lives UU Endowment Fund

Our collection for October will be designated towards the Black Lives UU Fund. Rev Thompson's column in this UNISUN explains more about this fund as part of "The Promise and the Practice of Our Faith" month at MVUUF.

Following General Assembly in New Orleans in June 2017, the UUA launched The Promise and the Practice of our Faith, inviting all Unitarian Universalists to be part of this historic commitment through 1) their financial support, 2) by scheduling at least one worship service around the campaign's themes, and 3) by making a long-term commitment to dismantling white supremacy, racism and oppression within our congregations, our Association, and beyond.

The purpose of the Social Action Committee is to provide opportunities for our fellowship to apply the UU principles and values by learning, contributing, and acting on social action issues in our local and wider communities. One way the group does this is to identify nine charities, with collection during each month, September to May. We have some groups we have been supporting every year, including OASIS, VEAP, a Camp UNISTAR scholarship, and the UUSC (Unitarian Universalist Service Committee). We have frequently made a commitment to a UUSC fund drive that is dedicated to addressing a large national or international recent tragedy. For the first collection of the year, a member purchases the privilege of choosing a charity at the MVUUF Silent Auction. So, last month we supported Very Special Arts Minnesota.

If you are following the math, that leaves four additional choices to be made. The fact that there are so many groups in need of support makes this a hard task. For many years, we have looked for groups to support that provide service in the metropolitan area. We try to choose places that have financial procedures in place (per Charity Navigator, etc.), and have a purpose that meshes with our principles. Discerning effectiveness is more complex, but we write about what we have learned about the group in the monthly UNISUN.

Supporting the BLUU Endowment fund is an easier task. Because we are contributing to an endowment fund, our support permits the BLUU group to have stable funding, and develop resources and activities within our congregation, and our Association, and beyond, for a long time. Each year, we will be able to expand the reach of our social justice activities!

### October 14, 2018 Sunday Service Special **Guest Speaker**

The Social Action Committee and Beloved Conversations participants are excited to announce that our Sunday service speaker for October 14, 2018 will the Mary Moriarty, Hennepin County Chief Public Defender. The service is titled "Race and the Criminal Justice System: Are We Awake". Mary was scheduled to give the service in April when the BIG SNOW STORM cancelled the service. We are happy Mary agreed to a rain check- or we could say snow check! For 2 decades Mary has tried many murder and serious felony cases including a number that set important state court precedents. She has acquired a national profile as a gifted courtroom advocate with a talent for training Macalester College Newsletter, profiled others in the creative, powerful trial skills she uses to secure acquittal after acquittal. Besides being a core faculty member of Gideon's Promise and a recipient of the Steven B. Bright Award, Mary is on the public de-

fender trial skills programs in many states. She teaches at the Harvard Law School Trial Advocacy Workshop and the National Criminal Defense College.

Recognizing that our state's incarceration rates are among the most disparate in the nation (blacks are 10 times more likely to be incarcerated than whites), Mary will talk to how racial bias distorts our criminal justice system.
