


Journey

NOTES FROM THE CHAIR KELLEY HUGHES, CHAIR

Our Stewardship Committee this year, headed by Jeanne Simpson, has done a masterful job in tapping into "Why I Give" among our community.

Recently, I have been thinking at length about Why I Give. I remembered that more than 20 years ago, I walked through MVUUF's doors as a young adult for the first time. I fondly recall then-Membership Chair, Barb Gilliand, warmly greeting me at the entrance. After some welcoming chit-chat, Barb introduced me to a number of folks, including her husband, Jerry Gilliand (who, several years later, became my co-facilitator for our youth sexuality education program, *Our Whole Lives Grades 7 Through 9*).

That was the beginning of my spiritual journey at MVUUF. In my time here, I taught religious education classes to students who are now themselves young adults. I also have known the grief of losing some fellow congregants over the years, and the comfort of living through this grief within our MVUUF community.

All these years, until a few years ago, I had considered my membership pledge as...well, a commitment I make, once a year, to give some my income to the larger budget I saw simply as "MVUUF." I saw it as a "price" I paid for membership, and for the right to vote.

Today, I see my pledge as so much more than this. My pledge helps keep MVUUF alive. My pledge helps supply our programs, classes, and services, so our volunteers and staff can run them. My pledge helps our volunteers and staff keep our building and grounds attractive and maintained, and a welcoming place for visitors and long-timers alike. These are only a handful of ways my pledge helps keep MVUUF alive.

Our pledges comprise 88% of our annual budget so that we have a place to meet, a place to share our joys and losses, a place to have fun, a place to learn, and a place to nurture the next generation.

For me, giving to MVUUF is part of my legacy.


Sunday March 31st is Family Night at Church

ANNUAL REPORT FROM VEAP

Every February VEAP gives the member churches a report on their activities as well as the needs for the next year. I will try to recap, simply, what this year's report entails.

VEAP clients are low-income households with incomes up to 200% of the Federal Poverty Guideline who spend 60-80% of their income on rent. 6,777 households were served in 2018. Bloomington residents make up 56% of VEAP clients; 25% are Richfield residents; 7% Edina residents; 7% from Minneapolis; 5% homeless or out of area

Forty Eight per cent of all monthly food pantry clients visit the pantry 1-4 times over the course of the year. The average number of visits is 5.6. Food Services include the Food Pantry, the Mobile Food Pantry, and the Student Hunger Collaborative (weekend food for food insecure students), Food Deliveries, Food Shelf Special Needs, Rides Home from the Pantry, Shuttle Service, and NEAT (Nutrition Education and Teaching).

VEAP distributes non-perishables, milk and other dairy, eggs and fresh produce which come from several sources. These sources are TEFAP—The Emergency Food Assistance Program, "Food Rescue" from local grocers, community gardens and farmers markets, and community drives. Over 3.64 million pounds of food was distributed last year of which half was fresh produce. VEAP has between 140-160 appointments every day. Clients can receive food monthly with 6 additional "produce visits" per year. Beginning last March, 4 Mobile Food Pantries were started as well as a new shuttle service and food delivery program was piloted.

In addition to the food program, VEAP provides social services to assist with employment, underemployment, and affordable housing. These programs are too detailed to discuss here but if you have questions about any of the services provided by VEAP feel free to ask me, Lorna Prell, and I will forward the data to you.

The End of an Era?

Recently Karen Olson, Janet Stevens, Leslie Swenson, and Barb Olson gave a memo to the board explaining that they would no longer manage the rummage sale. They cited several reasons – increasing difficulty obtaining donations and volunteers, declining attendance and sales as well as declining profits. (I suspect burnout had a good deal to do with the decision as well)

First of all, the finance committee wants to thank these women for all the hard work they have done over many years making rummage sales a success. The sale not only made a large contribution to Fellowship finances, but it also made a substantial contribution to building community at MVUUF. **So thank** you so much!

The rummage sale has a long history at MVUUF. According to the 50th anniversary history book the first rummage sale occurred in 1967. Beginning in 1976 the history records some rummage sales revenue. The figures are summarized in the table below along with some recent numbers.




