September: Belonging

You hardly knew/how hungry you were to be gathered in,/to receive the welcome that invited you to enter/entirely...
You began to breathe again...
You learned to sing.
But the deal with this blessing is that it will not leave you alone, will not let you linger.../this blessing will ask you to leave, not because it has tired of you but because it desires for you to become the sanctuary/that you have found... - Jan Richardson

Richardson begins with hunger. And so do we. Just saying the word "belonging" conjures it up: The primal hunger to be included; the longing to be let in. No one likes standing outside the circle. No one likes leaning against the locked door listening while everyone is laughing inside. From the time we are little, belonging is the thing we seek. It's the hoped for Holy Grail. The promised resting place.

But Richardson will have none of that. Our own belonging is only the beginning. That's what she wants us to know. One minute she's wrapping us in comforting words about settling in and allowing ourselves to finally breathe. The next she's shaking us awake and telling us to get up and go.

That shaking should tell us something. In other words, this is no gentle invitation, friends. No sweet reminder to think of others. It's a warning. A desperate hope that we will wake to the fact that there are two kinds of belonging: one that wants to bless us and another that wants to enlist us.

Deep down we know this. The hard part is to remember it. To use Richardson's language, if we find ourselves being invited to linger rather than leave, alarm bells should go off. We need to be weary of those who welcome us with a club jacket and a soft couch. They may have let us in, but soon they will enlist us into the work of keeping others out. There will likely even be a part of us that wants to keep others out. After all, closed circles don't just set us apart, they sit us above.

But they also keep us small. Maybe this is why Richardson's blessing is so intent on not leaving us alone. It knows that we only grow when the circle does. Circles that keep others out also keep the air out. No one inside a closed circle truly sings; they only suffocate, slowly.

It's all one big reminder that the true blessing of belonging is not that you get to come inside the circle; it's that you get to participate in expanding it. Again, as the circle grows so do we.

COVID Update

The MVUUF COVID Task Force and the board are working on updating and finalizing this fall's COVID policy. Please check back here, the Friday Email or online in October for an updated policy. In the meantime these changes are effective for September.

Same: Masks Required inside except when speaking from the pulpit (masks optional). Create a 10-foot minimum distance from pulpit to front row. The first row of seating could be removed to create a greater distance, if Hennepin County experiences a COVID-19 spike in cases and is at a medium level of risk according to the CDC.

New: People will be invited to sing masked. After testing negative for COVID-19 within 24 hours of performance, soloists or small groups of singers (3 or fewer) may sing without a mask from the 10+ foot distance.

New: Wind instruments may be played unmasked. No negative test needed because they produce aerosols similar to talking (source).

New: Like for summer parking lot gatherings, we plan to block off the handicapped parking spaces closest to the building door. This space will be used to set up snacks and refreshments after worship service. There are still several accessible parking spots and people may be dropped off and picked up right at the door as needed.

Note: Children and youth of all ages will be allowed in the sanctuary and have freedom of movement around the building.

In-person attendees are highly recommended to be vaccinated and boosted, as eligible. No one should attend in-person serves or gatherings if they have any cold or flu-like symptoms. Anyone testing positive for Covid-19 should notify the Fellowship if they have been in the building recently.

Belonging as a Definition: From the blog of Jacky A. Yenga <u>jackyyenga.com/the-spirit-of-ubuntu/</u> Visit the blog for the entire story, meanwhile here is an excerpt: "Ubuntu (oo-boon-too, n.) means, "I am because we are." Ubuntu is a Zulu or Xhosa word, and a traditional African concept.

Belonging in story form: "...And that when he said "Go!" they should rush over to the basket, and the first to arrive there would win all the candies. When he said "Go!" they all unexpectedly held each other's hands and ran off towards the tree as a group. Once there, they simply shared the candy with each other and happily ate it. The anthropologist was very surprised. He asked them why they had all gone together, especially if the first one to arrive at the tree could have won everything in the basket – all the sweets. A young girl simply replied: "How can one of us be happy if all the others are sad?"

Belonging as a quote from, Archbishop Desmond Tutu has this to say about ubuntu.

"Africans have a thing called ubuntu. It is about the essence of being human, it is part of the gift that Africa will give the world. It embraces hospitality, caring about others, being willing to go the extra mile for the sake of another. We believe that a person is a person through other persons, that my humanity is caught up, bound up, inextricably, with yours. When I dehumanize you, I inexorably dehumanize myself. The solitary human being is a contradiction in terms. Therefore you seek to work for the common good because your humanity comes into its own in community, in belonging." — Archbishop Desmond Tutu

Vision 2025

On July 14th The Board of Trustees made a formal charge to the Vision 2025 Committee. In part it, "asks the Vision 2025 task force to develop and document suggestions/ideas and action plans that financially support our mission statement in the coming years. In view of the changes in the world (politics, worldwide pandemic, inflation, recession, reduction in membership and giving) all aspects of our Fellowship...are open to scrutiny, change, and development."

The Vision 2025 (V25) group consists of Andrea Anderson, Doug Bruce, Richard Duffin, Eva Mach, Candace McClenahan and Jeannie Piekos. The group has met several times and will meet until the beginning of November when they will report back to the BoT. In October V25 will engage the Fellowship for input in order to explore what the ideal congregation looks like to you. They want to hear your dreams and visions for MVUUF. Please watch the Friday email and next month's Uni-Sun for dates to share your thoughts.

Members of the task force identified 4 buckets of possibility for growth and revenue: 1) Membership 2) Programs and Services 3) Facility use and 4) rental property. Each member has focused their participation to one of the buckets. Meetings are lively with ideas and brainstorming. The task force is currently reading three books that they will have on hand to loan. They are: *The Growing Church —Keys to Congregational Vitality; Turning Points—Essays on a new Unitarian Universalism and Full Circle— Fifteen Ways to grow lifelong UUs*

In the membership bucket some questions to ponder includes: What would the Fellowship look like with our full resources behind it. Is there something you personally would like to change or see? Use this as inspiration to look into our hearts and consider: 1. Our own personal generosity 2. Church wide generosity-Perhaps giving away a book that has UU values to newcomers? 3. Generosity towards the world-We already do a wonderful job of supporting charities with the collection plate Sunday morning. Perhaps we can build on that somehow.

From the programming bucket the group considered a thoughtful article by Carey Nieuwhof called *Five Post-Pandemic Church Growth Accelerators*.

An Actual Experience

For years, churches have grown through delivering great content. And trust me, excellent preaching still matters. The problem is that great content is no longer scarce. What used to drive church attendance—join us in the building at 10 a.m. for a brand new series—will no longer do so, because everyone now knows whatever message you're preaching will be live-streamed or available later on demand. And if your message isn't, no worries. They can choose from a million others that are. For free. Our culture is drowning in a sea of information. When people come to church, they're not just looking for information—they're looking for transformation. Today, information is everywhere. Transformation is scarce.

Community and Connection

Content used to be a competitive advantage. For the most part, it isn't any more. What is deeply scarce right now are community and connection. Authentic, loving and genuine community are more scarce than they have ever been in our lifetime. Every church should be running to fill that hole. Community means connecting people to each other in groups, serving, friendship and relationships. Nobody should be able to out-community the local church. Connection means that even for those joining online or attending in person for the first time, the primary job becomes connecting with them and then helping them find connection with each other. Moving forward, the competitive advantage of the local church isn't content, it's community and connection."

For Facility Usage the group recognizes that it's important to consider all aspects of building rental as well as the impact on staff, MVUUF programming and membership. Some ideas that have been proffered are: Other worship groups, affinity groups, preschools or daycares, office space for other organizations or individuals, and studio space for artists and musicians.

As the group contemplates its charge and brainstorms ideas, they find it important to keep in mind that the congregation is not being asked to "change" so much as being asked to adapt to the change that has already occured.


Join a Meditation Group this fall!


