Choosing Hope

It's not always easy to hear well this time of year, especially when it comes to hope. The dominant messages are about hope offering us calm: "A new day is on its way." "Justice and joy are growing in the womb and will soon be born." Hope, from this point of view, is a voice that reassures. It's a welcomed whisper that says, "Yes, the road you're on at this moment may be hard. But trust me, just over that horizon, there's a new world waiting for us all."

This soothing message comes to us as a gift. During difficult days, we all get tired. The fruits of our efforts are hard to see. The cold seems to have set in deep. We feel small, and alone. So, the promise that things will change offers us relief. We are released from the burden of believing that "it is all up to me" or that it all must be solved now.

It's a beautiful and needed message. But it's also only half of what hope is trying to say. Hope doesn't just whisper "It will be different," it also shouts, "It should be different" and "It can be different." Yes, it speaks soothing words about trusting and waiting, but it also takes the form of a holy impatience that declares, "Enough is enough. The time is now!"

In other words, hope doesn't just promise us that change will come in the future; it also changes who we are in the present. When we believe that a new day is possible, we don't just sit down and wait to see what happens. We get up and go out to meet the dawn. When hope convinces us that there are unseen forces working for the good, we begin to look around more closely, and in doing so, we notice that pain is not all that is there. When hope's holy impatience gets into our bones, we start acting as if we are worthy of that new day now. Which in turn changes others by convincing them that we all have waited long enough.

Bottom line: listening to hope makes you dangerous, not just soothed! It doesn't relieve us of duty as much as it reminds us that reality is more complex, unruly and open to change than the pompously powerful want us to believe. Yes, hope reassures, but it also emboldens. It doesn't just offer us a promise; it gives us a push.

But all of this only happens if we listen fully. So maybe the most important question this month is: "Are we listening to everything that hope has to say?"

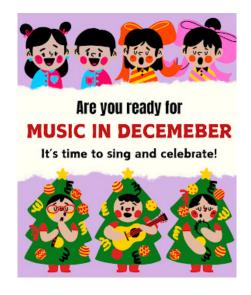

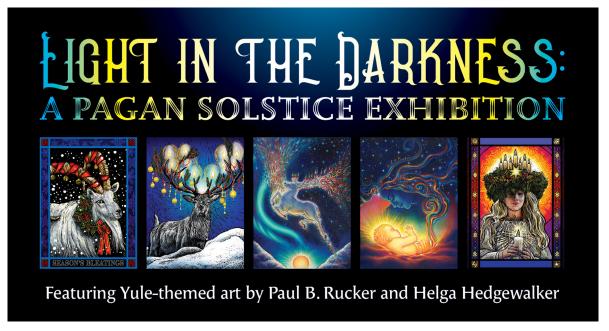

Light in the Darkness: A Pagan Solstice Exhibition Winter Solstice-themed art by Paul B. Rucker and Helga Hedgewalker.

This December and January we have a very special art show in our gallery. Both Paul and Helga are prominent artists and well-known in art and Pagan communities. They will join us in person on the Solstice for their art show opening following the Sunday Service. They will also be here for the Holiday Bazaar.

Two local artists explore the Pagan roots of Winter Solstice and the darkest time of the year, through images originating in traditions all over Europe. From the Yule Goat to the Solstice Stag, to Mother Night and the Yule Father, these interpretations bring beauty from the past into the present to help bring everyone through winter's cold, with a promise of light.

Helga Hedgewalker is a Mythopoetic Artist, Priestess and Witch with decades of professional experience in illustration, painting, and graphic design. She's currently busy with the forthcoming "The Craft of the Wise" tarot deck and book, from Llewellyn Publishing, early 2027.

Paul B. Rucker makes Pagan-inspired mythopoetic art in acrylic, pen and ink, pencil, and mixed-media assemblages (including face/body painting combined with digital imaging to create what he calls "camera paintings"). 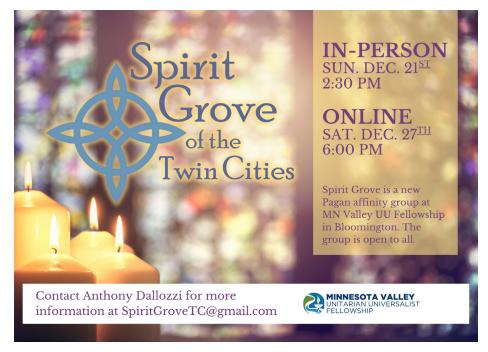

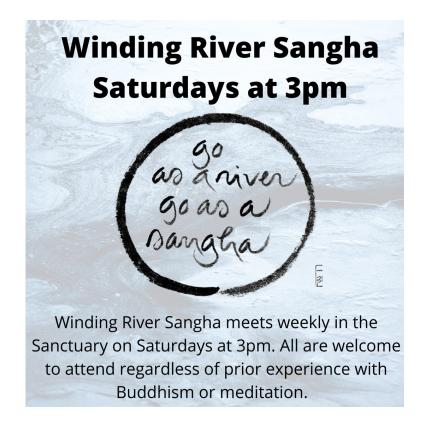
Religion Ethics and Ideas will meet on Zoom on Thursday December 4 at 7:00 PM.

Second Thursday will meet on Thursday, December 11th, 2025, at 7PM on Zoom (see link below).

Our topic will be the question: What does the County Attorney do?

We have two people well qualified to speak on the topic: Brad Johnson the Anoka County Attorney and Rebecca Trapp the Big Stone County Attorney. I expect they will be able address topics like prosecutorial discretion, plea bargaining, sentencing recommendations, child protection, juvenile justice as well as less high profile topics like reviewing county contracts, defending the actions of the county in court, legal advice on acquiring and selling county land.

Both Brad and Rebecca graciously responded to an email I sent to the staff of the County Attorney Association requesting a speaker. Brad will speak from the perspective of an urban county attorney (population 372,000 +) and Rebecca will speak from the perspective of a rural county attorney with a relatively small population (less than 6000).

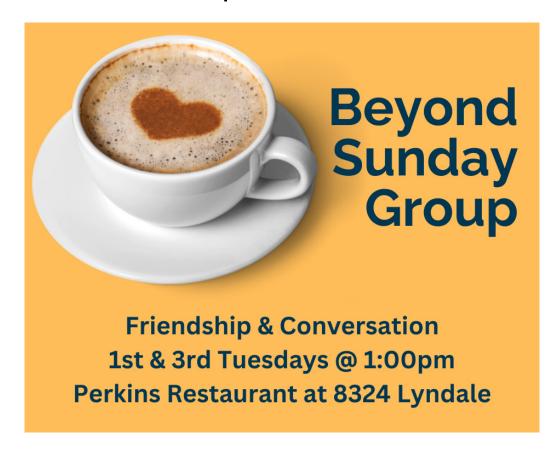

Yule, the celebration of the Winter Solstice, marks the longest night of the year and the moment when the sun begins its gradual return. Across many traditions, it is a time that honors the resilience of life during the cold and darkness, the slow rebirth of the light, and the deep renewal that emerges from stillness. Yule reminds us that even in the darkest season there is a spark of hope growing quietly beneath the surface, promising new beginnings, warmth, and the eventual flourishing of brighter days.

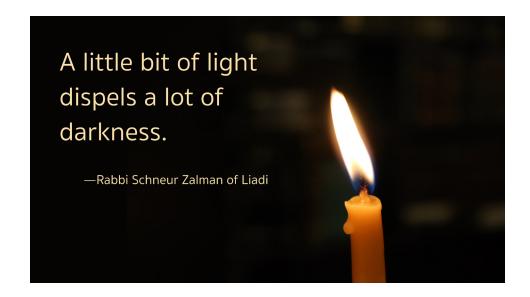
WiCoM's ritual will draw upon the strength and symbolism of Norse mythology to deepen our celebration of Yule. We acknowledge the powerful presence of Odin and the Wild Hunt—forces that sweep through the darkest nights, clearing away fear, stagnation, and the remnants of the old year. Together we honor the returning sun as a symbol of renewed hope and rising courage. Each participant will charge a crystal or personal token with the light of the Sol candle and the protective, wisdom-bearing energy of Odin. Helpful information

More to Recycle at MVUUF!

We are making a difference with Ridwell. It's wonderful that so many people are taking advantage of this premium recycling service. December pickups are the 3rd and 17th. Please have your recycling sorted properly by November 2nd and 16th.

Please see below for sorting your plastic packaging. We recycle two different kinds: multi-layer and plastic film. It saves staff time if the plastic is sorted correctly. Please watch the video or download to the app to determine what type of plastic you are trying to recycle.

MVUUF members and friends can recycle the following: multi-layer plastics, batteries, light bulbs, plastic



6-pack rings, plastic bottle caps, prescription bottles, cords and cables. Please be sure your items are clean and that your batteries are not corroded. Place items in the appropriate bag inside the box on the lost and found shelf by the front door. Additional information about what can be included is on the front label of the box. Thank you for helping MVUUF make a difference!

Remember plastic film goes in the bins on the outside by the front doors. Linda Hayen takes them to a different recycling service where they can be tranformed into park benches.
